(TALSTAR P) = Bifenthrin 7.9%, other 92.1%, (MEGAFORCE FC GEL BAIT) = Fiprinol 0.01% (ALPINE WSG) = Dinoefuran 40%, (ONSLAUGHT FASTCAP) Piperonyl 8%, Esfenvalerate 6.4%, Prallethrin 1.6%
